1905	Born Nov. 1 in St. Hilaire, Quebec
1922	Apprenticed to Ozias Leduc, as a church decotaror
1923	Enrolls at Ecole des Beaux Arts, Montreal. Upon earning
	his degree he begins to teach drawing there
1928	Leaves Montreal to study in Paris for two years
1932	Becomes a teacher of design in Primary Schools in Montreal.
	Influenced by children's art
1935	Marries Gabrielle Goyette
1937	Becomes a teacher of painting and art history at l'Ecole du Meuble, Montreal, a proressive design school.
1938	Reads André Breton's "Le Chateau Etoilé"; becomes interested in Surrealism
1940's	Associations with Pere Couturier (Domincan teacher and

1941	Creates his first abstract painting, Abstraction Verte
1941	Forms the <i>Groupe Automatiste</i>

1942	Exhibition of "surrealist works" in gouache by Borduas at

	both critically and financially.
1946-7	Groupe Automatizte exhibits in a series of makeshift galleries

1948	Publishes <i>Refus Global</i> , a manifesto countersigned by 15
-,	members of the <i>Groupe Automatiste</i> , in which he denounces
	the idea of preservation of a Quebec identity based on
	Catholicisim, French Language and rural customs; and the
	politics of Duplessis and the Union Nationale. This caused
	an uproar and let to Borduas losing his job at the Ecole du
	Meuble.
1951	Separates from his wife and two children
1953	Sous le Vent de l'Ile acquired by National Gallery of Canada
1953	Emigrates to the New York City
1954	First New York exhibition, at the Passedoit Gallery
1955	Moves to Paris with his daughter Janine.
1958	Represents Canada at the Universal Exposition, Brussels
1959	Fist Solo show in Paris, at Galerie Saint-Germain
1960	Dies of a heart attack on Feb. 21, in Paris, after several
	years of poor health.

1962	Retrospective at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, travelling
	to the National Gallery of Canada and the Art Gallery of
	Toronto
